# FOREWORD

2022 started as a year of hope, a year in which we finally could get rid of the COVID-19 pandemic. Meanwhile, we reformed our Cooperation Funds, including an increase in the potential support per initiative from 1,000 to 2,000 EUR, in order to stimulate members' initiatives to collaborate in higher education for sustainable development. In 2022, we also launched the CA Happy Hours. We want to make these monthly informal get-togethers more valuable by changing their format, for instance, inviting members who want to develop a project, or to discuss some interesting readings, or sharing insights from ongoing projects such as *TRACCskills* and *SDG-iLevel*.

The recent year also marked the advent of a few new members: We warmly welcome the University of West Attica (Greece), Vrije Universiteit Brussel (Belgium), University of Padua (Italy), and Ala-Too International University (Kyrgyz Republic) as an Institutional Observer.

We would like to congratulate the former leaders of the CA (Dr. Anne Zimmermann, former President and Dr. Ingrid Mulà, former Executive Director) as newly elected members of our Advisory Board. A very sincere 'thank you' for your relentless enthusiasm and commitment to the COPERNICUS Alliance! We would like to close this foreword with one big wish for our members: Have a very inspiring year and keep up the good work as ambassadors of transformative learning in higher education for sustainable development!

# 1. OUR VISION, MISSION AND VALUES

### Vision

"The COPERNICUS Alliance will be the leading European network helping people and institutions in a higher education environment to creatively address the challenges of tomorrow in a collaborative way, to jointly build the knowledge and competences needed for global sustainable development, and to actively engage with policy-makers and community stakeholders."

### Mission

The COPERNICUS Alliance (CA) aims to enable European higher education institutions and their partners to jointly identify challenges in higher education for sustainable development (HESD) and spearhead development of processes, tools, and knowledge to address these challenges from a whole-institution perspective. The CA provides a platform and organizes events where its current and future members can share resources and co-develop innovative education for



sustainable development initiatives. It provides "Cooperation Funds" for members' networking efforts and supports joint HESD proposals through advice and alliances. The CA also promotes engagement with policy-makers and community stakeholders at the European and global levels and regularly celebrates members' ambassador activities. The CA resolutely commits to reducing the ecological footprint of its activities.

## Values

Respect, commitment, and collaboration are deemed the highest values of the CA.

- **Respect** underpins members' interactions and collaboration. Our members greatly appreciate the diversity of the CA community and the inspiration they get from exchanging.
- **CA members commit to walk the talk,** guided by a holistic perspective of HESD and the Agenda 2030. This commitment is supported by the possibility of exchanging with other people and institutions, and engaging in common activities.
- **Collaboration** is the mode of work of the CA community, who shares knowledge and resources, seeks to increase the impact of their work together, and find common solutions and funding for projects.



# 2. MANAGEMENT

# 2.1. Leadership Team

# **3.** ACTIVITIES & INITIATIVES

In the <u>CA Action Plan 2019-2020</u> five priorities were identified that characterize the CA's unique strengths and important areas of action. These priorities remain valid to this day. The first two are thematic priorities (Goals 1 and 2), the third epitomizes the CA's mode of operation and commitment to sharing resources and learning (Goal 3), the fourth confirms the CA's involvement in European and global policy work (Goal 4), and the fifth characterizes the CA's operational needs as a learning organization (Goal 5):



For each of the **five strategic goals**, activities and initiatives were organized in relation to the abovementioned goals throughout the year 2022. We report on them below.



## 3.1. HIGHER EDUCATION SUMMIT 2022





After a series of online events in the previous years, in 2022 the COPERNICUS Alliance and Hasselt University organized a physical conference again:

From 6-8 September 2022 Hasselt University opened its doors to the conference highlight of the year: Well over a hundred participants from 26 countries gathered at the **Higher Education Summit 2022** in Hasselt, Belgium. Under the theme **"Daring to transform learning for a future-proof economy"** the summit brought together changemakers in the field of transformative learning for sustainable development within higher education. The program offered plenary sessions, interactive workshops, inspiring talks, onsite excursions, lots of networking opportunities and thought-provoking keynotes by Guia Bianchi, Sam de Muijnck, Vivek Gilani, Liesbeth Huybrechts, Kate Raworth, Gustavo Rodriguez, Olivia Rutazibwa, Stephen Sterling, Lilian Trechsel and Renate Wesselink.

## 3.2. CA Cooperation Funds



The CA aims to invest in members' activities by putting part of its annual budget aside to fund members' initiatives. Activities that contribute to the overall CA ambition to build capacity in higher education for sustainable development through collaboration can be supported with up to 2,000 EUR. #### Meet-up of Green Offices in Belgium

## 3.5. CA Happy Hour

## 3.6. CA Website and newsletter

## 3.7. Building opportunities for members

The CA has developed a profile that has made our non-profit network an attractive partner for European projects: In 2022, the CA was actively

involved in two Erasmus+ projects. The idea is to generate funding and other opportunities thanks to which CA members can engage in tangible projects that help to advance the CA's goals.



#### **TRACCskills – Transformational, cross-cutting people skills for the SDGs** EU Erasmus+ project, 01/2022-03/2023, 3 partners from 2 countries

*TRACCskills* is an Erasmus+ project implemented by Legacy17 (lead), the CA, and Visionautik Akademie. During 14 months, the project partners develop a practice-oriented draft compendium for use in designing and delivering high-quality, future-fit adult education. The intended users of the compendium are adult educators within the formal and non-formal sector who dedicate their work to ESD and the SDGs, and are open to rethinking and renewing their teaching practices. As part of this project, a <u>pilot course on "Transformative Decision-Making"</u> took place at Leuphana University Lüneburg from 6-8 December 2022 followed by a 6-week online course on "Transformational



People Skills for the SDGs" focusing on basic skills to lead and facilitate transformation processes. <u>Read more</u>

### **SDG Level** – Leveraging Individual SDG Contributions by University Staff EU Erasmus+ project, 01/2022-01/2025, 6 partners from 4 countries

*SDG-iLevel* is an Erasmus+ project led by the University of Girona. During three years, it aims to drive innovation and achieve sustainable impact in three topical areas of higher education: (1) sustainable development, (2) digital innovation, and (3) mental well-being of higher education staff. The project creates approaches, methods, and tools aimed at uncovering, harnessing, and strengthening the individual contributions of higher education employees to the SDGs in order to improve their mental well-being, job satisfaction, productivity, and teamwork and to promote further SDG contributions. Among other results the project will produce an Online Visibility Booster, a Self-Nudging Online Toolkit, and Policy and Implementation Guidelines. <u>Read more</u>

## 3.8. Outreach activities



Goals 4, 5

Participation in 7 national or international events and committees

The COPERNICUS Alliance was invited to join a workshop on "The future of university networks – What is their added value for each member university

and for the network?" at BOKU Vienna. The workshop on 24 May 2022 was organized on the occasion of BOKU's 150th anniversary which was celebrated with a memorable event entitled <u>"Featuring Future Conference"</u>. Former CA President Anne Zimmermann represented the CA at the workshop next to eight other networks. The aim was to analyze benefits of being member in a university network and members' expectations. The process will continue with follow-up meetings online.

Advance HE invited the CA to the international module of their **Top Management Programme**, which is a training programme for senior positions in the management of higher education institutions. Advance HE is a member-led, sector-owned charity that works with institutions and higher education across the world (but mainly well established in the UK, Australia and New Zealand) to improve higher education for staff, students and society. On 20 September 2022, CA Co-President **Tom Kuppens** hosted a workshop on **"Daring to transform learning for a future-proof economy"**, in line with this year's topic of the Higher Education Summit.

On 13 October 2022, the CA participated in the **annual meeting of the France & Benelux chapter of** <u>PRME</u> (<u>Principles for Responsible Management Education</u>) at the Rotterdam School of Management of Erasmus University. This year's topic was "Responsible Management Education: How to Drive Positive Change". PRME is UN's largest movement to transform management education.



Upon invitation by Prof. Kelum Gamage, Co-Director of the <u>Centre for Educational Development and</u> <u>Innovation (CEDI)</u> at the University of Glasgow, former CA President **Anne Zimmermann** gave a presentation on 31 October 2022 at the Sustainability in Learning and Teaching Seminar held by CEDI. In her contribution **"Embedding Transformative Learning in HEIs and Adapting Quality Assurance"** she spoke about stumbling blocks that prevent rapid adoption of transformative learning in higher education institutions and how these stumbling blocks can be addressed. The seminar series is offered by CEDI in collaboration with the Advance HE Sustainability in Learning and Teaching network.

On 22 November 2022, the CA was invited to be a stakeholder at the **Future Generations Summit** of the Belgian Foundation for Future Generations. Each year, this foundation issues the HERA (Higher Education & Research Awards) awards for young researchers and students who think and act according to a 360° perspective, i.e. taking a holistic stand towards sustainable development. CA Co-President **Tom Kuppens** took part in a debate on the topic **"How should business schools evolve to leverage societal transformation?"**.

The CA is represented in the **Ubuntu Committee of Peers** for the **Regional Centres of Expertise (RCEs)** by **Jana Dlouhá**, CA Advisory Board member. She participated in the <u>meeting of the Ubuntu Committee</u> from 14-15 December 2022 in Tokyo (see photo). The global network of RCEs is coordinated by the United Nations University Institute for the Advanced Study of Sustainability (UNU-IAS Tokyo). UNU-IAS has contributed to the effective implementation of the Global Action Programme (GAP) on Education for Sustainable Development by mobilizing actors, experiences, and expertise worldwide. Over 170 RCEs in the global network contribute to the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Through **Anne Zimmermann**, the CA is represented on the **Advisory Board** of <u>Legacy17</u>, an international cooperative of leading-edge practitioners of the 'people skills' needed to work effectively with transformative, regenerative processes in education, leadership, and community development, in the spirit of the SDGs.

# 5. FINANCES

The CA is officially acknowledged as an NGO under German law. Its finances and accounting are assessed on a regular basis by the tax authority of Lüneburg, Germany. They approve the status of CA as a Non-Profit Organization serving society with a research and science purpose.

### Income

The figure below provides an overview of the CA's finances. The CA's income consists exclusively of membership fees. In 2022, the membership fees contributed € 23,300.00 (from 28 member institutions/members) to the annual budget. Funding from EU projects is not included in this report.

## **Expenditures**

Expenditures relate to staff (Network Manager), events, Cooperation Funds, communications, administration, and profile and representation (includes memberships, travel, subsistence and fees to participate in important events where the CA profiles its work and activities).


The Higher Education Summit 2021 Online Teaser and the Higher Education Summit 2022 Physical Conference in Hasselt were co-organized by the CA and Hasselt University. Most expenditures related to both events were covered by in-kind contributions from Hasselt University as well as additional financial support from donors. Overall, the CA contributed with  $\notin$  4,305.46 to the organization of both events. One Cooperation Fund was granted to foster collaboration between members.

In addition to the described expenditures an important part of the CA workload is covered by in-kind contributions of the whole CA Leadership Team.

The year 2022 closed with a positive balance of  $\notin$  781.54, resulting in a total account balance of  $\notin$  25,034.00 at the end of 2022.
