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FOREWORD

In 2023, the WHO finally declared an end to the COVID-19 pandemic. World leaders have drawn up plans to tackle climate change, and the impact of artificial intelligence has been felt almost everywhere. However, the war between Russia and Ukraine intensified, the conflict in the Middle East escalated again, and many regions were devastated by forest fires, breaking summer temperature records. It has to be acknowledged that in such a tense and complex geopolitical situation, Agenda 2030 is receding from the top of the agendas of world leaders. In the face of lasting and unprecedented global challenges, as COPERNICUS Alliance, we persist in our efforts as ambassadors of transformative learning in higher education for sustainable development.

We are delighted that two new institutional members join us in this endeavor and warmly welcome UC Leuven-Limburg and Bern University of Applied Sciences to the network!

The event highlight of the year, the Higher Education Summit — Student Takeover from 23-25 November 2023, was the great result of a collaboration with students from oikos International. It was an opportunity for CA members and peers to rethink how the education system can become an effective driving force for a more sustainable future.

We initiated and continued many activities: We fostered exchange between our members in the CA Happy Hours and supported joint initiatives through

Cooperation Funds. In collaboration with DG HochN (German Society for Sustainability at Higher Education Institutions), we facilitated an exchange among European higher education networks for sustainability to share best practices and learn from each other. The CA became a signatory and 'Active Partner' of The Jena Declaration, a platform for coordinating local common actions globally for deep transformation, bringing together NGOs, schools, and others to inspire communities and governments to actively change in favor of sustainability.

Looking ahead, to continue the experience of working on an equitable basis with students, as of 2024, we have student representatives in the Advisory Board and offer a new membership category for student organizations.

We would like to conclude by congratulating Prof. Matthias Barth, Prof. Kim Ceulemans, and Dr. Jana Dlouhá to their re-election as members of our Advisory Board and, above all, express our sincere gratitude to all our members for re-electing us for another 2-year term and by extending our wishes for a more peaceful year to come for all of us.

1. OUR VISION, MISSION AND VALUES

Vision

"The COPERNICUS Alliance will be the leading European network helping people and institutions in a higher education environment to creatively address the challenges of tomorrow in a collaborative way, to jointly build the knowledge and competences needed for global sustainable development, and to actively engage with policy-makers and community stakeholders."

Mission

The COPERNICUS Alliance (CA) aims to enable European higher education institutions and their partners to jointly identify challenges in higher education for sustainable development (HESD) and spearhead development of processes, tools, and knowledge to address these challenges from a whole-institution perspective. The CA provides a platform and organizes events where its current and future members can share resources and co-develop innovative education for



sustainable development initiatives. It provides "Cooperation Funds" for members' networking efforts and supports joint HESD proposals through advice and alliances. The CA also promotes engagement with policy-makers and community stakeholders at the European and global levels and regularly celebrates members' ambassador activities. The CA resolutely commits to reducing the ecological footprint of its activities.

Values

Respect, commitment, and collaboration are deemed the highest values of the CA.

- Respect underpins members' interactions and collaboration. Our members greatly appreciate the diversity of the CA community and the inspiration they get from exchanging.
- CA members commit to walk the talk, guided by a holistic perspective of HESD and the Agenda 2030. This commitment is supported by the possibility of exchanging with other people and institutions, and engaging in common activities.
- **Collaboration** is the mode of work of the CA community, who shares knowledge and resources, seeks to increase the impact of their work together, and find common solutions and funding for projects.



2. MANAGEMENT

2.1. Leadership Team

The CA is coordinated by an elected Leadership Team. Since 1 January 2022, it is composed by three Co-Presidents: Asst. Prof. Dr. Elisabeth Hofmann (Université Bordeaux Montaigne), Asst. Prof. Dr. Tom Kuppens (Hasselt University & Vrije Universiteit Brussel), and Prof. Dr. Eglė Staniškienė (Kaunas University of Technology). They are supported by the Network Manager Mario Diethart and an Advisory Board. The Leadership Team and Advisory Board



members are volunteering positions. The Leadership Team is elected by the CA members for a period of two years.

3. ACTIVITIES & INITIATIVES

3.1. HIGHER EDUCATION SUMMIT 2023

The 2023 Higher Education Summit was special: The online conference from 23-25 November was the great result of a fruitful collaboration between the COPERNICUS Alliance and the students from oikos International, with support of SOS — Students Organizing for Sustainability International, the Green Office Movement, and the Club of Rome.

Envisaging a Copernican Revolution for a sustainable future, the summit raised the question: "How can we foster collective transformative learning and structurally integrate it into higher education to make it future-proof?" More than 100 participants joined the discussions on learner-driven education and participated in multiple formats including keynotes, podium discussions, a case fair and other interactive sessions. 


"The Role of the Human Dimension in Promoting Education for Sustainable Development at the Regional Level"


8 sessions

The CA has developed a profile that has made our non-profit network an attractive partner for European projects: In 2023, the CA was actively involved in two Erasmus+ projects. The idea is to

generate funding and other opportunities thanks to which CA members can engage in tangible projects that help to advance the CA's goals.



TRACCskills – Transformational, cross-cutting people skills for the SDGs EU Erasmus+ project, 01/2022-03/2023, 3 partners from 2 countries

TRACCskills is an Erasmus+ project implemented by Legacy17 (lead), the CA, and Visionautik Akademie. During 14 months, the project partners developed a practice-oriented draft compendium ("Unlearning for a Thrivable Future — A draft compendium for educators") for use in designing and delivering high-quality, future-fit adult education. The intended users of the compendium are adult educators within the formal and non-formal sector who dedicate their work to ESD and the SDGs, and are open to rethinking and renewing their



teaching practices. As part of this project, a <u>pilot course on "Transformative Decision-Making"</u> took place at Leuphana University Lüneburg from 6-8 December 2022 followed by a 6-week online course on "Transformational People Skills for the SDGs" focusing on basic skills to lead and facilitate transformation processes. SDG-iLevel – Leveraging Individual SDG Contributions by University Staff EU Erasmus+ project, 01/2022-01/2025, 6 partners from 4 countries

SDG-iLevel is an Erasmus+ project led by the University of Girona. It aims to drive innovation and achieve sustainable impact in three topical areas of higher education: (1) sustainable development, (2) digital innovation, and (3) mental well-being of higher education staff. The project creates approaches, methods, and tools aimed at uncovering, harnessing, and strengthening the individual contributions of higher education employees to the SDGs in order to improve their mental well-being, job satisfaction, productivity, and teamwork and to promote further SDG contributions. Among other results the project will produce an Online Visibility Booster, a Self-Nudging Online Toolkit, and Policy and Implementation Guidelines. Read more

Participation in 6 national or international events and committees

Together with <u>DG HochN (German Society for</u> <u>Sustainability at HEIs)</u> the CA initiated an exchange

between higher education networks in Europe. Three online meetings took place with representatives from numerous networks. The goal was to share good practices and learn from each other, e.g. on issues such as communication or students involvement.

The CA was a promotional partner for the **Sustainability Education Forum** hosted by the Association for the Advancement of Sustainability in Higher Education (**AASHE**). The virtual event took place from 8-9 June 2023 across multiple time zones and countries.

The organizers of the international workshop to build the **EU-India Roadmap for Cooperation on Biofuels** from Biomass for Aviation and Maritime Transport (21-22 August 2023) invited the CA to participate in the session on Social transformation in large scale systems and the role of skills and human capital. **Co-President Elisabeth Hofmann** attended this hybrid event online and gave a presentation on "Transformative learning and change for sustainable development – the role of education institutions".



The CA has become signatory and "Active Partner" of <u>The Jena Declaration</u>, which was launched in 2021 and currently counts almost 1,000 individual and institutional signatories. The Jena Declaration commits to the UN SDGs and follows six principles. It is a platform to coordinate local common actions globally for a deep transformation, which involves NGOs, schools, and others to encourage communities and governments to actively change in favor of sustainability.

The CA is represented in the **Ubuntu Committee of Peers** for the **Regional Centres of Expertise (RCEs)** by **Jana Dlouhá**, CA Advisory Board member. The global network of RCEs is coordinated by the United Nations University Institute for the Advanced Study of Sustainability (UNU-IAS Tokyo). UNU-IAS has contributed to the effective implementation of the Global Action Programme (GAP) on Education for Sustainable Development by mobilizing actors, experiences, and expertise worldwide. Over 170 RCEs in the global network contribute to the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). On behalf of the CA, **Jana Dlouhá** participated in the <u>RCE Global Conference</u> from 31 October - 2 November 2023 in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia as well as in the Ubuntu meeting. Among other topics, the future of the RCE movement and the role of UNU, international institutions and regional advisors were discussed.

Through CA Advisory Board member **Anne Zimmermann**, the CA is represented on the **Advisory Board** of <u>Legacy17</u>, an international cooperative of leading-edge practitioners of the 'people skills' needed to work effectively with transformative, regenerative processes in education, leadership, and community development, in the spirit of the SDGs.



5. FINANCES

The CA is officially acknowledged as an NGO under German law. Its finances and accounting are assessed on a regular basis by the tax authority of Lüneburg, Germany. They approve the status of CA as a Non-Profit Organization serving society with a research and science purpose.

Income

The figure below provides an overview of the CA's finances. The CA's income consists exclusively of membership fees. In 2023, the membership fees contributed € 23,800.00 (from 29 member institutions/members) to the annual budget. Funding from EU projects is not included in this report.

Expenditures

Expenditures relate to staff (Network Manager), events, Cooperation Funds, communications, administration, and profile and representation (includes memberships (e.g. IAU), travel, subsistence and fees to participate in important events where the CA profiles its work and activities).


The 2023 Higher Education Summit was co-organized with oikos International. The CA covered € 4,000.00 of the costs for the conference. One Cooperation Fund was granted to foster collaboration between members.

In addition to the described expenditures an important part of the CA workload was covered by in-kind contributions of the whole CA Leadership Team.

The year 2023 closed with a positive balance of € 1,472.51, resulting in a total account balance of € 26,506.51 at the end of 2023.
