London South Bank University (UK), by David Clemson

London South Bank University (LSBU) is one of London's largest and oldest universities and a founder member of the CA and a signatory to the UN Global Compact's Principles of Responsible Management Education. Building on the foundations of the MSc in Education for Sustainability which we began in 1994, sustainability and education for sustainability are important and inclusive themes with a strong presence in the teaching and research activities at LSBU. Specifically within the Faculty of Business, sustainability themes are given specific attention in the BA Business Administration, BA Business Management, BA Accounting & Finance, MBA, MSc International Business and DBA programmes. Examples of modules where sustainability features particularly are Business Risk Management, Knowledge, Globalisation & Development and Sustainable Development & Global Citizenship. Across the curriculum, sustainability is embedded in topics such as corporate social responsibility (CSR), socially responsible investment and sustainable employability.

The Centre for Efficient and Renewable Energy in Buildings (CEREB) demonstration and research facility at LSBU is now fully operational. Visits to the facility are included in MBA, MSc International Business and many Faculty of Business undergraduate programmes. With substantial funding from the Higher Education Funding Council for England (HEFCE) and the London Development Agency (LDA), this on-campus facility sits within the £1.5 billion Elephant and Castle regeneration zone and forms part of a London Energy Action Zone.

A number of Faculty of Business academics have contributed to the highly successful cross-faculty conferences on Embedding Sustainability within the Curriculum (2012 and 2013). The Faculty also completed a comprehensive curriculum review exercise in 2011. As a result, it has introduced sustainability themes in its major programmes. Moreover, the Faculty's Learning and Teaching Committee has a standing agenda item on education for sustainable development.

 CA new member, University of Siena, selected as the Mediterranean Hub for the UN Sustainable Development Solutions Network

We are delighted to announce that CA member, the University of Siena (Italy), has been selected by the United Nations as the Mediterranean hub for the <u>UN Sustainble Development Solutions Network</u>. This regional network, called the <u>Mediterranean Sustainable Development Solutions Network</u>, MED-SDSN, will gather member universities, research centres and businesses interested in identifying and promoting Solutions Initiatives in the Mediterranean basin.

The University of Siena and the SDSN are now launching a <u>call for proposals</u>, a competition among researchers/practitioners and students for the most practical and transformational solutions for sustainable development in the Mediterranean.

The Solutions Initiatives should be practical project proposals involving novel technologies, business models, institutional mechanisms, and/or policies that are promising but not yet proven. They should address a well-defined set of problems, have a transformative impact on sustainable development and be scalable, following a successful demonstration. They must be technically feasible and implementable within a reasonable timeframe without the need for

primary research.

The teams proposing the most promising solutions will be invited to present their ideas at the Siena Conference on the 5th of July.

◆ CA supports Charles University Environment Center and Schumacher Institute for Sustainability Systems Conference "Transdisciplinary Research on Sustainability in Europe: generic issues" (Prague, 23-24 May 2013)

The Schumacher Institute for Sustainability Systems and the Charles University Environment Center, supported by CA, will co-host a transdisciplinary research workshop in Prague, Czech Republic, on May 24&25 under the auspices of the CONVERGE EU FP7 research project and Czech MOSUR project. The one and a half day workshop is designed for experts from across the EU area who are working in Transdisciplinary Research for Sustainability (TDRS). The event is for professionals from European Research Area (ERA) organisations and policy areas and for those who are running (or have run) transdisciplinary research projects on sustainability. The aim of the workshop is to help inform the EU's research agendas and meta-agendas about evaluation, conduct and processes of TDRS with information, perspectives and analyses from practitioners, and to discuss and develop recommendations to the ERA to help enable better and more productive TDRS. ◆ CA contribues to Sustainability in Higher Education training for Moroccan Universities, Rabat (23-24 April 2013)

On 23-24 April, the Mediterranean Information Office for Environment, Culture and Sustainable Development (MIO-ECSDE) and the University of Athens (NKUA) co-organised a training at the University Mohamed V Souissi in Rabat, Morocco. The workshop, entitled "Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) in the University: Theory and Practice" was organised within the framework of the Horizon 2020 CB/MEP project, funded by the European Commission and coordinated by MIO-ECSDE. Prof Daniella Tilbury, President of CA, and other experts in higher education and sustainability were invited to lead training sessions and provide training to around 40 participants from 14 Moroccan Universities of different regions of the country.

 CA invited at the 7th World Environmental Education Congress (WEEC) in Marrakesh (9-14 June 2013)

The 7th WEEC will take place in Marrakesh, Morocco, from 9 to 14 June 2013. For the first time, a WEEC is being held in a country with an Arab - Muslim culture; and for the first time a theme (the relation between city and countryside in search of harmony) will be the object of great transversal attention across all the thematic areas.

Prof Daniella Tilbury, President of CA, has been invited at this international conference to present CA activities and the Rio+20 Treaty on Higher Education. Her keynote presentation will take place on the 13th June at the Plenary Session 3: "Diversity of Perspectives on Environmental Education: A dialogue between current knowledge and disciplines."

- ♦ Update from London South Bank University (LSBU, UK), by David Clemson
 - "Embedding Sustainability in the Curriculum: Practising what we teach" (Tuesday, 12 March 2013)

This was the second Embedding Sustainability in the Curriculum workshop at London South Bank University – the first was held last year, organised jointly with the London RCE. This year's workshop attracted sponsorship from the Higher Education Academy, CA, London RCE and UNPRME and included the book launch of Enhancing Education for Sustainable Development in Business and Management, Hospitality, Leisure, Marketing, Tourism (2013). Over fifty people attended from all over the UK and mainland Europe and importantly this also included students, social entrepreneurs and NGOs.

The keynote speaker, Prof Clemens Mader, Vice President of CA, from Leuphana University, Germany took as his theme Higher Education for Sustainable Development – regional and global capacity building for transformative change. Clemens spoke of the work of the COPERNICUS Alliance and, in particular, the role of higher education institutions in building capacity for sustainable development. His main purpose, however, was to introduce the

principles of the 2012 People's Sustainability Treaty on Higher Education – key among them being that to be transformative, higher education institutions must also transform themselves.

The book edited by Richard Atfield and Patsy Kemp was formally launched by Prof Daniella Tilbury, President of COPERNICUS Alliance. We invite you to <u>download</u> some (or all) of the chapters.

- Knowledge, Globalisation & Development - Engaging students in sustainability challenges

One of the modules offered at LSBU – Knowledge, Globalisation & Development – has a sustainability conference as part of its assessment, where learners assume the roles of CEOs of multinational corporations and have to contend with 'wicked' real world challenges. A group representing mining and oil/gas sectors were joined by Clemens Mader, Falko Schmidt (DESERTEC and London RCE) and David Clemson on Monday 11 March to discuss key environmental and sustainability challenges.

- Updates from the University of Natural Resources and Life Sciences (BOKU, Austria), by Matthew Aversano-Dearborn
 - Networked Climate Research in Austria

Each year the Austrian Climate Day provides an opportunity to gain an overview of the issues related to climate change, its impacts, adaptation and mitigation that are currently being researched and discussed in Austria. Around 190 Austrian researchers and interested individuals presented and spoke at the 14th Austrian Climate Day on the 4th and 5th of April. This was the seventh time that the event was held at BOKU, Vienna.

The event was organized by the <u>Climate Change Centre Austria</u>, the <u>Climate and Energy Fund</u> and <u>BOKU</u>, Vienna.

- Development of University-wide Sustainability Strategies

One of the key achievements of the Alliance of Sustainable Universities in Austria in 2012 was the inclusion of the development of a university-wide sustainability strategy with milestones and a time frame in many of its members' target and performance agreements with the Austrian Ministry for Science and Research. As a result, the Alliance is currently developing a handbook for the drafting of university sustainability strategies that aims to facilitate its members' efforts to elaborate their own sustainability strategies.

Germany)

The 6th World Student Environmental Summit (WSES) 2013 will be hosted at Leuphana University Lüneburg, Germany. Students from more than 40 different countries with different cultural and academic backgrounds will come to Lüneburg during 16-20 September 2013 to discuss urgent sustainability challenges.

In 2008, students of the Doshisha University in Kyoto organized the first WSES in Japan in the run-up to the G8-Summit. Since then the World Student Environmental Network (WSEN) organizes the WSES each year at a different country: Japan (2008), Canada (2009), Germany (2010), Sweden (2011), and Switzerland (2012).

The next WSES 2013 calls for Universities acting for sustainability! The aim is to connect and empower students to create long-term sustainability projects in their home countries.

The first English issue will be primarily focused on "mapping the field" in the Czech Republic, thus providing an insight into the state of the art with the intention to raise interest among the international community.
